In the forest understory, plant and animal life grows between the earthen ground and the forest canopy in both shade and sunlight. Recognizing that forest understories are places of beauty and strength, this conference will bring to light the many voices of Appalachia that are often shadowed or obscured. In the understories, people confront stereotypes, myths, marginalization, and violence and meet them with *resilience* and *hope*.

For the first time ever, the conference will be held on the 30,000-student University of Kentucky campus in Lexington, which has long earned recognition for its leadership in Appalachian studies. A broad range of UK colleges, centers, departments, and programs engage in research related to the Appalachian region.
